I mean, you get in, you've got guides there that you can do it. You maze through the tunnels.

And then you go to the forum and you have a look at that. And I just think really it's one of the top things that you definitely have to do. I think you stand - I don't know if you do it - but I stand in awe of how they built this and then how is it still standing? I mean, it is a ruin, but you actually get transported back in time to actually, unbelievably understand a little bit about the history.

But what you can do - is actually - you can spend time at the Roman forum and also the Palatine Hill, which is usually included in the ticket. So it's so worth going up to that hill because you can see down on what was ancient Rome and wow, it's so amazing. And then you just walk into the Centro Storico and you can see the pantheon, which is, you know, everyone - my favorite building. But I've just read recently that it is the oldest building that's still in use. Like it's been the most continuously used building.

And I mean and look at how we're going - everyone - we go through one thing and then we get to the pantheon and then we get to something else. And that has a really good memory because then the girls were playing with the little boys who were six and seven and pretending they were gladiators. And so I think it's it's the memories that you have from the experiences that you get. But definitely, Rome is one of those places. I mean, Katy, I see your picture of the kids over in Venice looking over the gondola to the gondolas. And that is my favorite family photo of those two little poppets that you have. So, for me, again, that's a great experience.

I think when we go, we just look at everything and the more you go, the more you find and the more experiences you have. I mean, we go now and our experience is more around bars and restaurants because our daughters and kids are a little bit older. So there's a whole different type of experience that we have now. So, yeah, so that -ancient Rome is number four.

You will remember that definitely that will be up there with wonderful memories for sure.

That was the other thing about it. So take lots of water.

Yeah, I think Florence is just amazing. My daughter spent four months living in Florence and went to uni there. And her favorite thing is to get a bike and just ride around Florence. For me it is one of the most beautiful cities and definitely has the most experiences because you can just go out to that whole Tuscan region and there's just so much and again, honorable mention to cooking classes all over Italy. So all over different regions as an experience as well. And Katy, you've spoken to some amazing people when it comes to cooking around Italy. So I think, again, tried to pick five experiences, but I think cooking wherever you are and learning to cook different traditional meals, whether in Florence or any part of Italy, is an amazing experience as well.

And there's some amazing people across Italy, amazing chefs and tours that you can do to learn how to make proper pasta like we were in Puglia. And you can learn how to make orecchiette.

And that is a very traditional and very difficult thing to make. So definitely would suggest find something and do it because it's an amazing experience.

Because a lot of the stuff, it's not something. it's not like the recipes we have maybe where it's like, oh, you know, whip this up in 20 minutes and it's actually going to take a little bit longer and a little bit more care and attention to make those dishes so you can appreciate them, even more, when you when you've learned how to make them I think.

And it's embedded in my memory, hiking the Cinque Terre. And the reason it's such a beautiful memory is my daughter and I got up at six o'clock from Monterroso and decided to hike, one of the five cities. And we hiked it. And it was amazing when you get to the top and again, I'm going to say that I was not the fittest. And so I did have a little bit of a cry on the way. It wasn't easy because it's

very tough terrain and it's not our normal Western type of trekking where there's paths. And it was quite... but I think it was the journey. It was the journey with my daughter. It was the talking. It was knowing that you were in an amazing place, experiencing something amazing. And the reason we left really early in the morning, because it gets very hot again, I travel... I like the heat. So for those of you who listen, maybe September, different times of the year might work. But for me, we did it in July, August, and it was very, very hot. So the reason we got up early and the actual fact that you actually got to the top. Took amazing photos. I did it with my daughter and then came back down into the town. And then my husband and other daughter, they caught the train and met us there for breakfast. And then we had lunch and it was amazing. I can't stress enough how amazing that terrain is, how spectacular the Cinque Terre are. The cliff path is amazing. The five towns are just like - they come alive. They're vibrant and colorful. And the people.. I honestly can't speak more about it. The food, the food is amazing. The pesto. You're never going to have better pesto than you have in Cinque Terre. So Vernazza and Monterroso. And it's just everything. I mean, Katy - I could go on. What do you think - as part of my top five?

And then you'd get back on the boat and then you'd go and have.. you'd go for a walk at one of the other... you started at Monterroso and you went through as it went. And again, when we talk about amazing days, it was one of the most amazing days that we've had. So you can do those boat tours all over Italy. And I know Capri is another one that you can do. You can do a tour or you can actually get someone to take you along the Amalfi spot. But for us, the actual hike is something you're never going to do anywhere else in the world and ee what you see. And I think the boat tour as well along the Cinque Terre is definitely something that I would highly recommend.

So I think it's definitely.. you got to look at.. maybe you can save a little bit more money on accommodation and throw it into the experiences, because that is where you're going to have the memories. You probably won't remember the hotel room unless, of course, it's got the terrace. But that's where I think the challenge is with Italy, unfortunately, there's a lot of choices that have got to be made, which can be hard. But you need to focus on what experiences are important to you.

Do your due diligence. If you are not comfortable walking with a lot of luggage and it's and you struggle because honestly I've embarrassed myself with luggage a lot as I'm dragging it along. So again, little hints that we've learnt along the way that Katy and I have experienced is just to add to that as well.

And he's always asking her to take photos as well. So how gorgeous. All right. You've given us four. Well you've actually snuck a few in, haven't you?

It's, for me, it is amazing. And it's something I'll share with all of you. Every time I go to Rome, I book a tour to go to the Vatican. And my husband wants to know how many more tours he's going to do at the Vatican and what part hasn't he seen. And the last time we actually did the.. we walked to the top/we did the top tour of the Vatican, where you can say all over Rome. And it was amazing. And then we went right down into the catacombs. So, again, I think that there is just so much, the Sistine Chapel, the whole.. just for everything, the art, the history, the religious side of it, the amazing renaissance art. I mean, it's everything. I can't even talk as much. I mean, you know, I've got my hands going everyone for those of you who can't see me and Katy is having a bit of a giggle because I'm using my Italian hands to just say how amazing it is. So for me, that is Number One experience that I think that you need to be doing. I'm a big believer of tours to understand the history because there is a lot of history within those walls that you want to know. I think that there's unique stories and I know Katy,

you've got some great tour people that you work with. And I think that it's definitely something, you know - walking tours, if we talk about experiences again, any tours, any walking tours of these amazing people that Katy has from Untold Insiders, that like, know the country better and know the city and know everything. And some of the art history or some of them are historians and so I've met some amazing people on this, so I highly recommend one, the Vatican, but when you do go to these places, really invest in understanding the history behind it and you get so much more of the experience as opposed to walking around going, oh, this is beautiful. But understanding the history behind everything, I think makes it that experience that will stay with you.

Have you been in the gardens?

And you have to prioritize and, look, for me every Wednesday.. and you'd have to look at, if you are Catholic or you're not and you want to see the pope, the pope has different days that he actually comes out as well. And every time I've managed to get there, I've missed it. So I am now.. my itinerary.. so for those of you who do want to have that experience of the pope - make sure that you get on to the Vatican website. They tell you when he will do his prayer. Also, bear in mind that in August, he also goes to his summer home. So he does take a little bit of break. And so there are times that he does it. Also, I would check what is happening at the Vatican because we were there two/three years ago and they had canonization of some... it was a huge... all of Rome was under siege... Pilgrims everywhere. So, again, if you're wanting to know what was going on in the Vatican before you book, definitely book/check the Vatican website for all of the information, because we were there and we probably missed it. And I did know that there was a canonization and I probably would have liked to have been there, but that was the day I was leaving. So there is definitely things always happening at the Vatican that can also if you just wanted to do a tour and again, I've done the Walks of Italy tour and I think they're an amazing company and the people are really knowledgeable. And as you said, Katy, they've got some great little quirky things that they know, but definitely have a look at the schedule for what is happening at the Vatican, because that can actually impact a lot of not just the Vatican City, but it can actually impact the whole of Rome as well, because people or pilgrims come in if it's a very special event. So I'd double checked that as well.
