You see, Valerie had planned a trip to northern Italy with a friend, but at the last minute, things went a bit, shall we say, pear shaped or awry. And she had to do some quick thinking and reorganizing to get things back on track. Let's hear from Valerie now about how she planned her trip to Italy and what she discovered when she got there. Yours was one of them I used to see in the female travel bloggers group and others in there that have traveled all over abroad. So that really fueled my wanderlust to want to go to Italy. And a girlfriend of mine asked me in September of 2019 if I would like to go to Europe, and she had been there several years ago, backpacking in Spain, France, all over Western Europe. And so I felt confident to go with her because she already had been there, knew what she was doing. Well at the last minute she could not go. She had a family issue. It wasn't really emergency, but it was a serious thing. And so I understood. But at the same time, I freaked out. And thankfully, your group rescued me Untold Italy or Italy travel planning, rather, which is a thing off your blog. Anyway, that rescued me and helped me plan my trip and gain confidence to go as a solo female to a foreign country. And if it hadn't been for that, I don't think I would have went.

Oh look, I remember it so well. You were so worried, which is completely normal. And natural - when you're traveling halfway around the world to a country you've never been to on your

own. And it was just an amazing response. And I actually would never forget it because so many people just came and said, Valerie, you've got to go. You've got to go to Italy. You're going to love it so much. And thankfully, you built up the confidence to do it. And I'm just so happy that you did.

Yes, I'm very happy it was the trip of a lifetime and the memories are forever etched in my head, I will never forget them. And yeah, it was one of the most amazing trips of my life.

Oh, I can't wait to hear all about it. OK, so let's just take a step back and have a chat about what you planned for your itinerary. So you were going to visit northern Italy weren't you?

Correct. So I chose Milan because I and my friend, whom we had planned to go, she also had a friend there that she wanted to hook up with. And so when we started talking about taking the trip, we started discussing itinerary, as you just asked, and Milan came to the forefront because I love fashion. I've always been a huge fashion lover. And I so and my blog was originally about fashion. And as time went on, I added travel. So now travel is my main niche, but fashion is still there. So anyway, going to Milan, the fashion capital of the world, was always a dream of mine. So I made that my home base. And then when it ended up that I was going to go by myself, I was like, oh gosh, what am I going to do now? How am I going to visit all these other places? Am I going to reserve a hotel two days over here, a day over here, take the train, lug my suitcase on the train four different times? And I'm like, no, I'm not going to do that. And then when I talked to several women in your group, you know, some of them advised me, well, if you could stay in one place and I even thought of that myself, too. So I planted myself in Milan close to Milano Centrale. It was about five minutes from the train station. And it was awesome because every other day I was there for a total of nine days, including my flying time, which was not enough. Big mistake. If you go to Italy, don't stay for a week. It's not enough. But anyway, yeah, I did day trips every other day and that worked out great.

But I driving down the city, sitting in that big double decker bus on the top and, you know, just taking it all in. I saw lots of amazing architecture like castles for Sozesco. I think I'm saying that.

The Duomo was probably my number one and the rooftop at first I wasn't going to go to the rooftop. I took a tour with Get Your Guide. And so they took us around the inside and then they said, you're free to go up to the top and you have to purchase a separate ticket. And it took a little longer than I thought. And it had other things on my list that day for my itinerary. So I go, I don't know, I think about it. Well, I almost didn't do it. And then a couple of days before I left, I'm like, I've got to get up on that rooftop and I'm so glad I did because. Oh, my. The views from up there, you can see all over the whole city the pictures you can get and you can actually walk through all those big, huge architectural needles or whatever you want to call them. There's little like arches and you can walk all around the perimeter of the roof like it was just incredible. So the Duomo and then also the Starbucks Roastery Reserve was pretty incredible. The pastries were to die for. I'd never seen anything like that either here in America. And then, oh, the shopping. The shopping was amazing. I could have spent just a whole month on shopping in Milan and I didn't even cover an iota of it. But my favorite spots I loved Corso Buenos Aires because it's this big, long street and it has lots and lots of affordable goods, outfits, accessories, et cetera. And I loved Vittorio Emanuele. And yeah, those spots were pretty incredible. And I just spent some time walking around Vittorio Emanuele and just taking in the incredible architecture and all the beautiful shops and things to look at.

So I really regret that - who goes to Italy and doesn't come back with a pair of shoes? I mean, come on!

And you you go 'oh I got it in Venice!'. Oh, well, so you love the Duomo. And obviously the Duomo is amazing. And the Galleria, which is right next door and the castle. And did you manage to get down to the canal area in Milan?

I did. The canals of Navigli. That was pretty cool. I actually did that the same day as I went to the Prada Museum. So a little side note about the museum. It was great. It was big. It was grand. But I was very disappointed because there was no fashion there. It was all art. There was a few outfits. But, you know, that's my bad because I didn't research or I mean, I looked it up on the website, but I didn't really dig into the details. So little hint there. If you know you're going to a museum, dig into the details, because it might not be what you think. But that trip turned out that day to be really cool because right around the corner from the main street drag that you take, it's not very far from the canals down to the museum was this huge street market like a flea market. And I just hit it lucky because I talked to a few people there and they said, oh, yeah, this only happens once a year on this day. And I'm like, really? Well, I hit pay dirt. Except the bad thing was, is I was near the end of my trip and I hadn't taken out a lot more cash. So most of those places only accepted cash euros. And I didn't have any very much on me, I think at 20 or 30. And so I spent the last of my change. But so another hint. Keep lots of cash in your pocket. Well, not lots, but if you're going on a day trip like that, make sure you have enough. Because surprise things like that pop up and then.

Yeah it was amazing. There was people there with scarves and, you know, T-shirts and food. Street vendors with food. It just went on for blocks and blocks. I thought my feet were going to fall.

I mean, you can buy something, everything there from like old records to chandeliers and but they in immaculate quality, like it's not like a second hand market sometimes like you get here. I don't know about where you are - but these are like some really fancy, beautiful things you can get the. All right, was there anything else you wanted to mention about Milan?

Milan has like - it seems like a hundred different modes of transportation. I could not believe it. There's motorcycles, cars, cable cars, the metro, the train, and then this other thing that looks kind of like a monorail, I mean, the options are endless. So you don't have to worry about getting around Milan. It's just navigating how to get there.

Yeah. Look, I think it's worthwhile doing a bit of research before you go to understand the transport options of Milan. You do actually need, well unless you are staying right in the center, you're probably going to have to need to use some transport. Unlike some of the other cities that you might visit - so in Florence and Rome, oftentimes you can get away without using transport, but yeah, I think, yeah, you need to really look up and see where you are on the transport map and get some help from someone who's going to help you.

I learned some valuable lessons, like the fact that I got thrown into this by myself at the last minute. I was trying to focus on the details that would help me survive the most. And transportation is a big one. But I was more focused. I guess on finding the trains to go on the day trips and I had no problem with that. You know, it's really easy to navigate and reserve it online with Rome to Rio or Italia Train. Both of those are really good sites, easy to navigate, very affordable. And I had no problem with that at all. It was just when I was in Milan trying to navigate the Metro. So.

I think it's really interesting because Milanese a really big city and it's you know, it's not necessarily as touristy as some of the other ones. So people like any big city around the world, people are trying to get to their business and that's why they're kind of rushing around. But let's talk about some of the day trips, because I think you really did make most of your time there by - what a clever idea to do one day in Milan and one day as a day trip. I think that's a great idea. So you get the time to wander and recuperate and understand the city a bit better. And then also you see some of the parts of Italy. Great idea.

Yeah. So the day trips I did from Milan were Cinque Terre, Venice. So those two I did on my own. I planned the whole thing on my own, taking the train and doing the sights on my own. The third one was a bus tour that left from Lugano, one of the main train stations just over from Milana Centra. The name of it has left my mind, but it's a pretty popular one and one of the bigger train stations. And so Get Your Guide tour leaves out of there and you'll see it when you reserve the tour. But anyhow, it was a bus tour and both of the agents on the bus were very knowledgeable. They were locals. And so they took us over the Italian border into Switzerland, to Lugano, Switzerland, and we spent three hours there. Then we went about fifteen minutes and hopped on a ferry. I'm from Washington State and the ferries here are humongous. That ferry looked like a toy car compared to the ones we have here. But anyhow, it still fit cars and it fit a lot of people on it. So of course we walked on and left the bus on the side of the road and we went to Bellagio. And the Bellagio is so dreamy. It's like you're in another world. Oh, my goodness. And in Bellagio is where I had the very best meal. I sat on the waterfront overlooking Lake Como. It was in late October and the hot sun was beating down. It was about seventy five degrees, clear blue skies, pretty Alps back dropped all around us. And I ordered as the tour guides recommended, they said, OK, if you if you want to taste authentic Italian cuisine here, order perche fish over a bed of rice. Oh my goodness. To die for I will never forget how good that was. So I had that. We spent about four hours. I got lost. I went wandering way up the hill. There's a huge hill there and I kind of departed from the group when she first took everybody on a little walk into it for ten minutes and then she said she let everybody loose. Well, I kind of departed from the walking tour a little sooner than I should have. And when I tried to come back, I made a wrong turn and I ended up at the top. I mean, it seemed like it was an island, but I don't think it is. It just seemed that way. And I was at the top of the island in my mind. I had to be back by a certain time or they would leave without me, so I just kept at it and finally this American couple was walking out on the street in front of me and I said, hey, are you going down to the waterfront? And they said, yeah. I said, Can I follow you - I'm lost! They said, sure. So I made my way back down there. And then we hopped back on the boat after four hours and the tour continued all along Lake Como. It was a really nice, beautiful, long ride. I think it took about two hours and the boat docked in Como City. But anyway, on the way, the tour guides pointed out all the big celebrity homes. Of course, George Clooney, our beloved George Clooney house is over there on the left and he didn't invite us in for lunch. Can you believe that? But anyhow, the nerve of him and so does Sophia Loren house, the Versace mansion and pointed out several. So that day was a really incredible day. It lasted 10 hours and I was exhausted, but it was so much fun. And I actually met another girl from Australia on the bus on the way back, and I still talk to her. So that's the beauty of traveling around the world, meeting new cultures, new people and new friends.

I used to be like a backpacker that would be like, hey, I'm doing this all myself, but now I'm like, I just like someone else to do it for me.

And we divided into two groups and we had the earphones and the little case that hangs around your neck so they could talk to you the whole day. So, yeah, it was pretty amazing.

So I was like, yeah, well, the morning I left for Cinque Terre, the weather was great in Milan. But another story down in Cinque Terre. That's another thing I wish I would have researched a bit more is what's the weather going to be like in that particular destination on that exact day? And I could have maybe switched things around because let me tell you, they had a storm warning. It was absolutely horrible. I thought I was back in Seattle during a winter windstorm. It was pretty bad. And so she came and picked me up at the train station. I changed trains in La Spezza. Is that how you say it?

I only have one day here. We can't even do anything. So we went to her Airbnb, which that was a highlight of the day because it had an incredible view with shutter windows that opened out the to the ocean there. And there's the colorful boats, all marooned there in the bay and all those boats there in bright colors and all the beautiful little apartments stacked up and the bright cheery stucco colors. Everything you see in the pictures, it's exactly what it looks like. And the sound of the waves crashing up against the shore. So she made me breakfast and then we went out, explored a little bit, even though it was pouring. I did get some pictures. She took some pictures of me. And we did get to eat in a coffee shop that was open. We had lunch and then we went and ventured up the street a little bit to a market. And by then it was time for me to go back. So disappointing about the weather. But nonetheless, I can say I've been there, I got some videos and just wet my wanderlust to want to go back there and explore the other villages because I heard they're amazing.

But again, it wasn't a really stormy day. But what actually happened to us was that it was rough seas enough that all the ferries were canceled. So what that meant was all of the trains that were running were absolutely packed with people. And it was it was actually horrible, so squashy. So it's just it's such a little thing that you think, well, do I check the weather? But, yes, check the weather, especially if you're going somewhere coastal and maybe you can switch things around because I do have some quite crazy storms in the Cinque Terre I actually like and it can be very wet and wooly, as you discovered.

All right. So you also went to Venice on a day trip?

Yes, I went to Venice. Same thing. The weather. It wasn't near anything like Cinque Terre, but it wasn't the best. But I guess, you know, it's the time of year. It was the third week of October when I got there, it was drizzling a little, was a little cool. But as the day went on, the sun came out and it got warm. And so it turned out to be a beautiful day. But funny story about that. Another thing about research and you - all you people listening, probably think, boy, that woman needs to do her homework!! I did do some homework, but I learned that I need to, especially when you go to a foreign country and it was my first experience. You really can't spend enough time researching. Do as much as you possibly can. So the water bus system there - not to be confused with water taxi, because water taxis, I found out, cost a lot of money to rent and you either rent them in a group or solo. So don't make that mistake because it will put a big hole in your pocketbook. But I went on the water bus while I knew about Venice and I knew there was these other stops or islands and it's all built on canals. But I guess I didn't really understand how Venice was set up or how I just said, oh, I'm going to Venice. I was going to stroll around. So the first thing I did when I got there is I was like standing out on the Grand Canal. I got off the train. I was in absolute euphoria. I could not believe what was in front of my eyes. Like, I just couldn't believe it. And you can't really even describe how it feels to you go or understand it. It's another world. It's an old world history. It's beautiful. It's I can't even put into words the thoughts that went through my head.

And I heard you in your group and through the grapevine that St. Mark's Square is the place to be. So that's the first place I headed. So I'm just taking my time strolling around there, looking at all the shops, drinking coffee, eating a Cannoli and all the good stuff. And time was ticking away. I got there at nine a.m. and my train to Milano left at 5:00 p.m. and before I knew it, it was 2 o'clock. And I was sitting there eating lunch, a Caesar salad on the water, looking out at the canal. And the waiter came over and he was asking me how I like my trip so far, blah, blah, blah, blah. And am I going to see the other spots in Venice? And I go, Yeah, but I said, I don't really understand how this works, like I see this boat going. But does he stop at all of. Yes, yes, yes. He goes, well, what time are you leaving? I said 5. He goes you've got lots more to see. You better hop back on that bus. I was like oh boy and then I start getting stressed out. So I ran over to the back over to the waterbus counter a little stand and said, hey, I need a ticket. And this is how much time I have, you know where else can I go? And she goes, Wow, you should go check out Lido I said, OK, great. So I went to Lido and I got off the bus, the waterbus, and I started strolling and I was like, oh my goodness, this does not look like Venice. This looks like a beach town in California.

Is that some of the places, particularly down south, there's some really interesting mosaics and things that wash up and like they can actually be like thousands of years old. So that's why they have these rules.

It was another surprise to me, I think, surprising me and Milan. A lot of the businesses were owned from people from Middle Eastern countries. I was surprised by that, but quite a few. Yeah. And so that was really cool to get their perspective on things. So that was one thing. And then one big, huge tip. This was the thing that led to me having a huge meltdown the day I got there. So of course, I had been on the airplane for twenty four hours without sleep. I had a stopover at Charles de Gaulle in Paris and then into Milan. And anyways, when I got to the airport, that experience was fine. I took the train from Malpensa into Milano Central. So I remember asking in the group about international phone service and

all that kind of stuff. And a lot of people chimed in and said that their particular carrier had international service and it was really great. But if your carrier does not offer that which mine did not, and they said you can purchase a TIM card instead of a SIM card, and they said you can get it down in the bottom floor of the Milano Central Train Station. So my main goal when I got there was to try to find my hotel and I was depending on this SIM card business with the SIM card to work. So I went right down there and asked the guy if I could buy one and he said sure, and he sold it to me. And then I said, well, aren't you going to put it in for me? Because I had no clue how to do it. And he said "no, I'm not going to do that. I can't". I said "what?" I said "well, I don't have a tool". First of all. I mean, I know where it comes out. I shouldn't say I didn't know how to do it, but it wasn't the easiest thing in the world. Like, you have to have the right tool to open it. So I couldn't get it open and by then, I was in tears because I was like, how am I going to find my hotel now? Because my Internet wouldn't work. So I went back up to the first floor and I started scouring the crowd, trying to, you know, maybe find somebody that looked American. I don't know or, you know, that spoke English. And I stepped outside and there was a podium there for busses going back to the airport. So I'm like, that guy has to speak English because all these people are coming here, you know, to reserve a bus. So I went over there, said, hey, you know, "I'm lost and I'm trying to find my hotel. I just got here, my internet... Do you speak English?" "Yes, I do." I said, "Oh, thank you. Thank you. Thank you. Can you tell me where so-and-so hotel is?" And he said, yeah, it's just five minutes this way. Turn right." When I first looked up the door of the train station instead of the streets running crossways are parallel to each other. But, yeah, I think when you're used to being connected and you're used to knowing that you can just hit Google Maps and everything's going to be magically fine, then it can really be a little bit confusing. impressed. You had all these challenges and you just overcame them, but was there one place in your trip that you just absolutely loved and it made your heart skip a beat.
